

What did you do or consider doing before entering the community?

Even before college, I was pretty sure I was going to study chemistry at the graduate level. It was what I went to St. Francis University (Loreto, PA) to study, and I really didn't know about the friars or even religious life until I began undergrad at St. Francis.

What drew you to the TOR friars?

As I got to know the friars, I realized there was something about the way they lived and carried themselves that I wanted in my own life. There was a sense of freedom about the friars, a freedom that was a result of holiness and prayer. I began thinking about what it would be like for me to be a friar, and began more serious discernment my senior year of college.

What are some hobbies you enjoy?

I enjoy playing piano, and music in general. I also enjoy reading. I'm always looking for creative ways to make coffee, from the French press to the vacuum press.

Favorite saint and why:

I like St. John of the Cross and St. Theresa of Avila especially because of their spiritual writings. Their emphasis on simplicity and contemplation resonates with the Franciscan tradition. Their writings make the spiritual life come alive and offer a lot to pray with.

Favorite Bible verse:

Rom. 5:5: "Hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us."

Advice to discerning men:

I think the most important thing for me when discerning was to develop my prayer life. I think that if someone focuses on prayer, God will let them know his will in their lives in a way they will understand and that will give them peace. Having a spiritual director also helped develop my prayer life and discern and follow God's calling.



GOSPEL MEDITATION

Recently I had a skin rash, and it was awful. (Please don't tell anyone.) I am embarrassed to admit that I didn't handle it well. Complaining, whining, begging for sympathy, and crying were my responses to the merciless itching and burning. In the aftermath, a silver lining emerged. I feel a new

heartfelt sympathy for all those vexed with chronic skin problems. If you've ever had a seemingly unending skin problem, you know how that sympathy flows up from deep inside.

This gut-level compassion is something like what the Gospel describes in Jesus when the sore-covered leper says, "If you will it, you can make me clean." At this, just before the healing, Jesus was "moved with compassion." The Greek word used here is strong and earthy, closer to "his bowels and guts trembled with the deepest emotions of sadness, pity, and love." In Jesus, God heals our infirmities not from a divine distance but by learning what it feels like to be us. He acquires first-hand experience of what it costs us to be afflicted and still be faithful to God. He sympathizes with the burning, itching, and blistering of human existence in the deepest, first-hand way. To discover that is to touch Jesus' heart.

What in your life, right now, is breaking out like diseased skin? What is getting worse the more you try to soothe it? Perhaps only you feel it. Or maybe it's exposed to all. A bad habit, broken relationship, loneliness, fear of failure, self-hatred? Name it, and then find a way to bring it confidently to Jesus who will feel what we are feeling, and thereby heal us.




BUILDING A CULTURE OF LIFE Pope Benedict's Encyclical "God is Love"

Pope Benedict XVI says the following words in his encyclical letter "God is Love": "In sacramental communion I

become one with the Lord, like all the other communicants. As Saint Paul says, "Because there is one bread, we who are many are one body, for we all partake of the one bread" (1 Cor 10:17). Union with Christ is also union with all those to whom he gives himself. I cannot possess Christ just for myself; I can belong to him only in union with all those who have become, or who will become, his own. ... Love of God and love of neighbor are now truly united: God incarnate draws us all to himself. ... Here the usual contraposition between worship and ethics simply falls apart. "Worship" itself, Eucharistic communion, includes the reality both of being loved and of loving others in turn. A Eucharist which does not pass over into the concrete practice of love is intrinsically fragmented" (n. 14). These words remind us of our calling to love all our neighbors, born and unborn.

I turn to you, Lord, in time of trouble, and you fill me with the joy of salvation. (Ps 32)



EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

Present in the Eucharist

If you witnessed a miracle, wouldn't you want to tell everyone? If you saw the sun dance in the sky, a crippled man walk, or the Virgin Mary appear in front of you, wouldn't you just want to shout about it from a rooftop so all could hear? Maybe you would be afraid others would not believe you. You might choose instead to keep it to yourself to avoid criticism and ridicule. At least, if you saw a miracle, you would have a choice: to tell or not to tell.

Yet, at every Mass we witness a miracle. We witness bread and wine as it becomes the true presence of Jesus Christ. It isn't a saint or Mary appearing before us; it is actually Jesus! When was the last time you told anybody about that miracle?

It might not be easy for us to always talk about our faith, but we can show them. When we receive the Eucharist into our bodies, we become one with Christ. We go forth from the Mass as a living testimony of the miracle that occurred at Mass. People will not be able to simply look at us and see the evidence. We need to demonstrate to them the reality of this miracle by our good deeds and profound acts of charity. That is stewardship. That is bearing witness to the truth of our God being truly present to us. It is something we should want to share with everyone.





(PRACTICING) CATHOLIC

Sin and Loneliness

When I was in high school, we read "The Metamorphosis" by Franz Kafka. It's a depressing little novella about a man who (spoiler alert!) turns into a cockroach and dies of neglect, his family gradually ceasing to recognize the creature he has become.

"Never underestimate how badly human beings need touch," our teacher told us. "Without each other, we curl up and die."

Our need for communion with each other is written into our biology — breathing and heart rate of newborns regulates when they lie against the skin of their mothers, and we instinctively reach out to embrace someone who has been wounded. But it is also written into our souls. Consider the early days of the pandemic, and the emotional starvation we all experienced, prevented from gathering in groups to worship, to celebrate and to mourn. And when we did encounter other people, we kept a mutual distance. "I feel like a leper," we grumbled to our families when we returned home, because we finally understood it: the real tragedy of leprosy is not pain and disfigurement. The real tragedy of leprosy is loneliness.

"If you wish, you can make me clean," begged the leper as he knelt before Christ (Mark 1:40). He wasn't begging for deliverance from pain and disfigurement. He was begging for deliverance from isolation.

"If you wish, you can make me clean," we beg God in confession, not because we are physically withering and dying but because we are so desperate to once again be held in His embrace.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? - CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED Saint Vs. Blessed


Question: What is the difference between a "Saint" and a "Blessed"?

Answer: The process of proclaiming someone as a saint in the Catholic Church has evolved over the course of many centuries. In the beginning, those honored as saints were almost exclusively biblical figures or martyrs. However, after the legalization of Christianity in the fourth century, new holy women and men came to be honored as saints, and this was often done by popular acclaim or by the local bishop or abbot.

It was Pope Gregory IX (who was pope from 1227 to 1241) who officially proclaimed that only the pope had the authority to add someone to the official list (the "canon") of saints. This is the meaning of the word "canonization."

Today, the saint-making process includes several steps, including detailed studies of the person's life and a recognition that they died as a martyr or lived a life of "heroic virtue." Once someone is recognized as a martyr or if a miracle is attributed to their intercession, they will be beatified and honored as "Blessed." This means that they can be celebrated by Catholics in a particular country or region or by the members of certain religious community. If another miracle occurs and is approved, then the "Blessed" is canonized and honored with the title "Saint," meaning that they are now officially recognized as a universal model of holiness and an intercessor.

SAINT OF THE WEEK – EXAMPLES OF OUR FAITH

Blessed Imelda Lambertini

Blessed Imelda Lambertini (1322-1333) was born into nobility in Bologna, Italy. Her parents recognized her extraordinary spiritual

gifts early on and, when Imelda asked to live with the Dominican sisters, they agreed and enrolled her into the Dominican convent of Val di Pietra when she was only nine years old.

From the moment she entered the convent, Imelda developed a love for the Mass and the Eucharist although, according to the tradition of the time, she was considered far too young to receive it. Despite being denied her first Communion, she would spend hours in prayer and Eucharistic adoration, frequently begging her superiors to allow her to receive the Eucharist. Sometimes, while in prayer, she was known to enter deep states of contemplation.

In May of 1333, on the Feast of the Ascension, young Imelda experienced a remarkable and public event following Mass. As she knelt in prayer, a Eucharistic miracle unfolded before everyone's eyes. The sacred Host miraculously lifted into the air and suspended directly above her, shining a radiant light onto her. This miracle, witnessed by the sisters as well as by the priest who was celebrating Mass, persuaded her superiors to allow her to finally receive Communion.

As the story goes, Imelda was allowed to stay in the chapel for a time to pray after the miraculous event but, when the sisters who went to collect her, they found that she had died. She was still kneeling in prayer with a smile on her face. They determined that she had died of pure joy.

Blessed Imelda is considered a model of childlike faith, exemplifying the importance of approaching Christ in the Eucharist with a pure heart and childlike joy. Blessed Imelda, pray for us! ©LPi





Question: Why do we place ashes on our forehead each Ash Wednesday?

Answer: Ashes are rich in spiritual symbolism. We recall in the second chapter of Genesis, when the human person is fashioned "out of the dust of the ground" and receives the breath of life (Genesis 2:7). In death, a person returns to the ground from which we came. The ancient Hebrews used ashes as a sign of repentance, reminding themselves that God is God and we are not.

As the minister places ashes on our forehead, we hear either "remember that you are dust and unto dust you shall return" or "turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel." When we receive ashes, we remember our own mortality. We're reminded that we have limited time on this earth and we ought to make the best use of it that we can! People are in need of love, care, and compassion. We all need to continually rediscover the love of God. The Gospel invites every person in every stage of life to encounter and imitate Jesus here and now. The forty days of Lent are the perfect time to assess our own awareness of these realities.
