

A Happy Ending Isn't the Whole Story

"Is there a happy ending?"

When my kids were young, we never made it past the first whiff of any narrative tension before I got this question. As soon as whatever princess or furry woodland animal who was the hero of the story got into any small scrape, they wanted that reassurance, "Is there a happy ending?"

I can't say I blame them. Don't we all feel that way sometimes? We enter into a relationship with someone or some situation, and we just want to protect ourselves. We want to know it's not going to go badly — or, if it does, that we will be able to come back from it. It's a human instinct, a reflex. Our inclination to protect ourselves makes it so that we sometimes want to press fast-forward on the bad stuff and skip straight ahead to the happily-ever-after.

Easter is the ultimate happy ending. It's the day of miracles. The day when all the stones roll away and all the sins are forgiven. It's the day that puts everything right.

But if we learned anything from this week — from the Passion and death of the Lord — it's that we can't press fast -forward on the hardships of life. That tension, that loss, that fear — it's crucial, isn't it? As Catholics, we are who we are because of Easter. But Easter doesn't happen without Good Friday.

So, does the story of salvation have a happy ending? We know it does. But we also remember that the ending isn't all -Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS that matters. © LPi




CONFIRMATION PREP CLASSES

GOSPEL MEDITATION

Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord

Outside Chicago, there is a small cemetery in the woods behind Mundelein Seminary, where I was a student. One night I was exploring it. I looked up and was shocked to see an imposing seventeen-foot angel towering

over me and preparing to blow a trumpet. Adrenaline rushed through me. Quickly I realized it was in fact a massive bronze statue. I tried to calm myself down. But it still freaked me out.

As we begin to celebrate Easter today, this image might seem a bit unnerving. But please recall that for the first disciples on the morning of the resurrection, it was precisely that. It wasn't joyful at first, it was terrifying. It wasn't peaceful, it was unsettling. In that Jerusalem cemetery, something otherworldly had happened. Angels announced that he was no longer dead, but alive. They had blown their trumpets, so to speak, and Jesus had risen. Soon the disciples' shock in that dark cemetery would turn into joy.

We all have our own places of the dead, too, don't we? Deceased loved ones. Our tired patterns of blame. Relationships stuck in resentment. Indifference to the poor. Lost dreams. Despair about our future. Fear of sickness and death. These are our "cemeteries" where we don't expect much to happen. Today we enter — if we dare — those places with the disciples. See the mighty angel standing there, trumpet ready to blare! — Father John Muir ©LPi



SAINT OF THE WEEK – EXAMPLES OF OUR FAITH

Venerable Francis-Xavier Nguyễn Văn Thuận

Venerable Francis-Xavier Nguyễn Văn Thuận, (1928 – 2002) was born in Huế, Vietnam and was the nephew of South Vietnam's first

president. He entered seminary when he was a teenager and was ordained in 1953 at age 25. By 1975 he was appointed as the coadjutor archbishop of Saigon, just as the Vietnam War came to an end. Only six days after his appointment, Saigon fell to the North Vietnamese Army and Francis-Xavier, targeted for his faith and connections, was arrested, and detained by the regime. For the next 13 years, he endured immense hardships in captivity, including nine years of solitary confinement.

Throughout his imprisonment, Francis-Xavier's devotion to Jesus sustained him. Denied access to the Mass and to the Sacraments, he secretly celebrated Mass while confined with whatever resources he could find — even if he only had a few drops of wine and a piece of bread as the elements for the Eucharist.

While imprisoned, he became known for his joyful spirit, sharing hope and encouragement with fellow prisoners, and writing powerful faith reflections on scraps of paper, which were smuggled out and circulated among Catholics worldwide.

Released from prison in 1988, Francis-Xavier continued to inspire the Church from house arrest as well as from exile in Switzerland. In 1994, Pope John Paul II appointed him as the president of the Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace, recognizing his dedication to promoting peace, reconciliation, and social justice. Fourteen years later he died of cancer in Rome at the age of 74.

In recognition of his heroic virtues, Francis-Xavier Nguyễn Văn Thuận was declared Venerable by Pope Francis in 2017. His cause for beatification is ongoing, and he continues to be an important figure for those facing oppression and adversity, inspiring them to remain steadfast in God's love. What Would Mary Do?

This Easter morning, I am thinking of Mary Magdalene.

I want to know her state of mind as she approached the tomb in the darkness. Was she afraid? Was she thinking clearly? Was she tired? Had grief and trauma robbed her of her sleep the last two nights? What did she intend to do? Anoint Christ's body, yes — but what else? Kiss his hands, trace the markings where the lash had fallen upon his skin? Say goodbye? Weep? Despair?

What were the words she planned to whisper into the cold, empty darkness that morning, as she wept over God's body?

I don't know anything about her state of mind that Easter morning, except that I know she wanted to be with Christ. Perhaps that was all she knew, too. Perhaps she had no other thought, no other desire, than nearness to him. She didn't need to understand everything, and she didn't expect answers — she didn't dare hope for that.

But everything and everyone had fallen apart around her, and in Jesus' presence she knew her heart would be able to rest.

If you have ever been in the midst of a crisis in your life and found yourself pacing the floors of your house when no one else is awake, muttering the words to a prayer you know by heart, you know what Mary Magdalene felt. In those moments, we do not always feel God's presence. Sometimes, when we look for Him, we only see an empty tomb.

When these dark moments come, I pray you will remember the faithfulness of this great saint. Be like Mary Magdalene. Look for Jesus, always. You may not always find him, but he will always find you.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? - CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED Spiritual Communion

Question: What is spiritual communion, and do you need to be in a state of grace to receive it?

Answer: The practice of making a "spiritual communion" dates back several centuries and St. Thomas Aquinas described it as "an ardent desire to receive Jesus in the Holy Sacrament and a loving embrace as though we had already received Him." Traditionally, a prayer of spiritual communion has been used by those who are unable to receive sacramental communion because of health, inability to attend Mass, or who cannot receive communion because of grave sin. This practice has been encouraged by many saints and spiritual writers and most recently Pope Francis encouraged the practice when the realities of the COVID-19 pandemic prevented so many Catholics from taking part in the Mass or receiving sacramental communion.

Although the graces offered in spiritual communion are not the same as those offered in the sacramental communion of the Mass, this practice is still a powerful opportunity to express our desire for union with the Lord and to be united with Christ and the Church, even in an imperfect way. ©LPi




BUILDING A CULTURE OF LIFE

THE DATE OF EASTER


Question: Why does the date of Easter change every year, while most other celebrations are celebrated on the same day?

Answer: Every feast is celebrated at a certain time for a reason. Saints feast days are commonly the day of their

death. While we don't know Jesus' exact birthday, we celebrate the "light of the world" around the time of winter solstice, as dark, wintery days begin to lengthen again. We have a historical clue, however, to when the Easter events occurred. We know that Jesus was crucified the day before Passover. The Jews calculated the date for Passover based on both the solar and lunar calendars. It corresponds to the first full moon after the spring equinox. The early Christians maintained this connection in their celebrations of Easter on the first Sunday after the paschal full moon.

We don't re-calculate the full moon every year. As astronomy developed, so too did the forecasts of when Easter would occur in future years. The Church has created a table of calculated dates, projecting the date of Easter decades in advance. The date of Easter also determines the date of Ash Wednesday and the season of Lent, as well as the feast days following in the Easter season, including Pentecost. So these feasts move, too! This tradition may seem complicated, but it connects our Christian faith now to what has come before — our Jewish roots and the real, historical reality of Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection.

Good and gracious heavenly Father, we come before you on this Easter Sunday with full and grateful hearts for the gift of the Paschal Mystery that you showed us in the life, death, and resurrection of your Son, our brother by adoption, Jesus Christ.

Hope in an Empty Tomb

This Easter, in churches all over the world, people will be fully initiated in the Catholic Church. Those who have come from another Christian denomination have already begun their journey with Jesus Christ. But for those who are baptized at the Easter Vigil, a new reality has come to pass. Each newly baptized man, woman, and child have become new creations in Jesus Christ. They have died and risen with the one who rose on the third day and whose empty tomb we celebrate every Easter. Easter Sunday morning, they awake after many months of RCIA and all have the same question before them: "Now what?"

When one finds themselves having journeyed through various thresholds of conversion and now they bear the name of Christian, the time comes to chart the course of life as a disciple. Stewardship is that course of life. How one lives out their life from now on is the life of stewardship. The less one understands true stewardship and the value of their gifts and talents to the Body of Christ, the harder the journey.

Those of us who were baptized many years ago can easily fall into a false sense of comfort. We forget that sense of excitement those coming into the Church experience at the Easter Vigil. However, the story of that empty tomb reminds us of the power behind our baptism. Today, we, too, are called to discipleship and a stewardship way of life. Jesus continues to provide the answer to our, "Now what?"

Read the Acts of the Apostles During the Easter Season

(Fr. Dan notes: I found this on the Internet but don't know who the author is to give proper credit —but it's a great introduction!)

INTRODUCTION TO THE BOOK OF ACTS

The Book of Acts, the full title of which is the Acts of the Apostles, has a unique place in the Church's liturgy and in Scripture. In the liturgy, for the whole Easter season, rather than reading from the Old Testament, we take the first reading from the Book of Acts. The Easter season focuses on the fruits of the Resurrection of Jesus, and that includes the Acts of the Apostles.

In Scripture, the Book of Acts fulfills a unique role in the New Testament, acting as a kind of bridge between the Gospels and the letters of St. Paul and the other Apostles. It is also the only narrative account of the beginnings of the Church, and gives us the historical context for the letters. As John Bergsma puts it, the Book of Acts is the only "biography" we have of the infant Church.

Written by Luke, the Book of Acts is basically the sequel to the Gospel of Luke, continuing the story of Jesus' mission. Luke ends his Gospel with the Ascension of Jesus into heaven; he begins the Book of Acts with the disciples awaiting the coming of the Holy Spirit. In Acts 1:1, Luke tells us that His Gospel dealt with all that Jesus began to do and to teach; the Book of Acts, by implication,

then, tells the story of what Jesus continues to do and to teach through his followers after the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. One of the things to notice as you read Acts is how the disciples do what they do and say what they say in the Name of Jesus. After Pentecost, where the Holy Spirit descends upon the apostles in the upper room (Acts 2), the book recounts the spread of the Gospel, as, filled with the power of the Spirit, the disciples continue the work of Jesus.

The Book of Acts can roughly divided into two general sections. The first section focuses on St. Peter and his ministry, and the second section on St. Paul and his ministry. And while there are some who try to drive a wedge between Peter and Paul, St. Luke is careful to present them as equally important and parallel figures in the infant Church. They both preach the same message (see Acts 2, 3, and 13). They both heal a lame man (3:1-10; 14:8-11). They both heal people without even so much as touching them (5:15 and 19:12). They both defeat magicians (8:9-21 and 13:8-12) and both raise people from the dead (9:36-42; 20:7-12). Both Peter and Paul confirm others with the Holy Spirit after they have been baptized (8:17 and 19:6), and both escape miraculously from prison (12:6-9 and 16:19-34). So while the book of Acts is basically divided between the two ministries of Peter and Paul, Luke shows that there is a unity: both of them are carrying out the mission of Jesus, doing the works He did, and preaching salvation in His Name.

There is also a geographical progression, a fulfilling of the Great Commission which Luke reports in Acts 1:8, as Jesus says to them: "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, throughout Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." After the coming of the Spirit at Pentecost (Acts 2), the disciples first proclaim Jesus in Jerusalem, then throughout Judea and Samaria, and then to the ends of the earth, with the great missionary journeys of St. Paul, as recounted in the second half of the book.

WHAT TO PAY ATTENTION TO

Acts is a book precisely of action: the apostles act, going from one place to another, preaching, performing miracles. But underneath it all, the Holy Spirit is acting in and through them; the Holy Spirit is the protagonist of the Book of Acts. It is the Holy Spirit who is at work in the apostles, enabling them to continue the mission of Jesus with the same works of Jesus done in His Name. As you read, try to pay attention to and trace the following themes:

- The action of the Holy Spirit
- The power of Jesus' Name
- the growth of the Church
- conversion
- Kerygmatic preaching
- bearing witness
- the sacraments

It will help you to take notes as you read. If you read the four suggested chapters each week, you can divide them up during your week, so that you can read, say, a chapter a day Monday-Thursday, taking notes on each chapter, and then on Friday or Saturday, go back and review your notes.

KEYS FOR PRAYING WITH THE BOOK OF ACTS

Scholars say that Luke intentionally left the Book of Acts incomplete—it ends with Paul still in prison—because he wanted readers to recognize that the Holy Spirit wants to keep writing the story of the growth of the Church in and through each one of them, each one of us. We are supposed to continue the work of the apostles in our own lives, here and now, in 21 st century Oregon. So spend some time in prayer with what you read, and ask yourself: Are there any parallels in my own life? Where and how is the Holy Spirit seeking to work in and through me? How is Jesus calling me to be a witness to Him? What have I seen Him do in my own life or in the lives of those around me? What is God calling me to do today to continue "writing" the book of the growth of the Church?


